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# Obituary – Gwen Phillips (1932-2015) by Alison Haskell

The world became a brighter place when Gweneth Lillian Fisher was born in Petersfield in Tilmore Gardens on 4th February 1932. She had two older sisters, Margaret and Joy. She always said it was a little annoying being the youngest as she had last dibs on everything. She remembered that there was no proper bathroom in their house and the loo was outside. They had a tin bath that was brought into the scullery on bath nights and they used to take a bath in the order of age, Mum remembering that they could only fill the bath once and the water was never that clean when it was her turn. Despite all of the disadvantages of being the youngest she always had a glow about her which she bore right through her life.

At very early age she showed a particular talent for playing the piano and although not at all well off, her mother sent her for piano lessons. She eventually



passed the highest grade possible, grade 8. She was so well-regarded due to her virtuosity when playing that she played for an audience at the Petersfield Festival Hall.

Gwen went to Steep school and had good and bad memories of those years. The sisters used to have to walk 2 miles across fields to school. She remembered that in one of the fields there was a cow called Daisy who she was terrified of as Daisy used to chase them. She also recalled that once she was caught eating chestnuts in class and had to stand on a stool for the remainder of the day. So although we always knew of the angel in her, there was a little devil there as well.

One special memory she shared was of her father who perhaps she got the little devil in her from. As they were not at all well off there was very little money for treats. Her father worked on the railways and sometimes he used to come home with pockets full of sweets that had somehow fallen off the sweet train.

She left school at 14 and became an apprentice dress-maker in Petersfield which stood her in good stead for the future as she made many of her two daughters' clothes when they were young.

At a still tender age she became a nanny for the Tibbitts' family in a large house in Peterfield – a position which led to one of the greatest adventures of her life. Commander Tibbits was posted to Bermuda for two years and the family invited Gwen to join them. With great trepidation her mother and father allowed her to go. She had wonderful memories of those days but one story she would tell was about the wildlife. She was terrified of spiders especially the oversized ones in tropical Bermuda. So the housekeeper and Gwen came to an understanding. The housekeeper would remove the spiders from the house if Gwen removed the chameleons!

The Governor of Bermuda acted as Gwen's guardian and as he realised Gwen had a special talent at the piano invited her to play the piano at Windy Ridge, his home.

After spending 2 years in Bermuda the family returned home and Gwen took up a post as a dental nurse at Dragon House in Petersfield. Unlike the dental nurses of today she had to do most of the jobs at the practice like filling in forms, being the receptionist, developing x-rays and producing the casts for false teeth. She said if the false teeth didn't fit she knew she had done it wrong! She then took a little time out to work on the land, including wonderful memories of riding on the backs of carts and hop picking which suited Gwen because of her love of the countryside. However she was welcomed back to her dental nurse job later on.

Then began the next greatest adventure of her life. One day her sister Joy was to play the piano for two young men to practice their singing at Tilmore Gardens but Joy couldn't make it so Gwen stepped in. One of the young men was a dashing chap called Peter. Peter recalls that first meeting clearly and his first impression which was...."COR!"

Their second meeting was when Peter was singing in the choir at a concert in a church in Drayton and Gwen was in the audience. Peter remembers that his heart was all a flutter and hasn't stopped fluttering since. Peter was not going to let this one get away, and later popped the question and they married in Steep church in 1960. They set up home in Drayton and three years later Alison was born.

Six months later they found a lovely home in Uplands Road in Rowlands Castle with a large garden which was perfect for Gwen's love of nature and the outside. In 1966 their second daughter Wendy was born.

Gwen took on many odd jobs to supplement their income while the children were young which included house-cleaning and collecting insurance payments for Provident. One of the collection visits she used to make was a house in which the occupants' hobby used to be home-made wine-making. Every time she was offered a glass or two and it didn't take long for her to realise that home-made wine is often a lot stronger than shop-bought and made riding home on her bicycle a little precarious. So, with this knowledge and a few glasses under her belt she ensured that this was the last house she visited on her rounds. The option of refusing the wine obviously didn't occur to her!

However she will most fondly be remembered by so many people for her selfless activities for others in the village of Rowlands Castle. She was an active participant of some of the church events in the village when the children were young and used to play the piano for the Sunday School and help out on Sunday School trips. She also helped to set up the luncheon club which helps many people who would otherwise find it difficult to have a home-cooked meal and to get together with others once a week. She was an active member of the WRVS and received a special award for 25 years in the service. And of course, in the way we all know her, she didn't expect it and was confused at all the fuss about something she did out of love and caring for others. And even though in her later years it became more and more difficult for her to get around and do many things, she still carried on with all the help she could offer even though perhaps she should have been receiving the help, instead of giving it. A perfect example of this is although she officially

retired from the luncheon club a number of years ago, in her life long need to help people she was still doing the driving rota until recently despite not being in the best of health. Peter describes her as an "example to us all" and it is true that most of us would have difficulty living up to Gwen's unfailing selflessness and kindness.

Peter recalls that they never had a proper row although sometimes it seemed that there was ammunition for one. Apart from her love of everyone around her, her greatest love was for her garden. She used to say one of the things that frightened her most was Peter with a pair of secateurs! However in the aftermath she always forgave him and he wasn't in her bad books for more than a few seconds.

Another of Gwen's greatest loves was the love of nature and the countryside. Many hours of her life before she was less able to get around were spent in the great outdoors, walking many miles through fields, woods and pathways especially in the areas around Petersfield. Occasionally that little devil inside her would pop up if there was a particularly beckoning pathway that was "out of bounds". Peter and the girls remember times when Gwen would confidently trespass because she just couldn't resist it while they cowered behind her watching out for the farmer who might angrily appear asking us if we had seen the no entry sign! And shhh...sometimes it wasn't just mud that she brought home on her shoes. In the days before it was taboo, a few wild flowers would find their way into little vases in the house. She needed the countryside indoors as well as outdoors. And many a winter fire was fuelled by logs which used to be brought home hidden in the pram with the baby on the top.

She had a love for animals as well. When she was a child the family had chickens and rabbits (although these were really kept "for the pot") but also dogs. In later years with Peter they had two dogs, Mop and Pixie both of which she loved so much.

Gwen was also a long-term member of the Music Society and the Gardening Club attending concerts and talks with great relish.

We need to mention that Gwen had one beloved grandchild Toby who tragically died a little while ago at the age of 17. She was of course heartbroken but always treasured her time with him and never regretted those precious moments despite her pain.

It is telling that from the huge number of cards from so many people that Peter and the girls have received that there are words that come up again and again. Words like "gentle", "kind", "calm", "considerate", "warm", "generous" and "twinkling smile". Those of us who were lucky to know her well know she had an infectious brightness about her which even on a dull day brought a little sunshine to our lives.

There are so many more words of admiration we can say about Gwen and each of us has our own special memories of her. Most of these things can't be written down as they are feelings, all of which are wonderful and warm and cannot be described in mere words. We will remember her with those feelings and keep them safe and precious as her memory makes each of our lives just that little bit better for knowing her. Here's thanking her for being the remarkable Gwen. Thank you wife, mother and friend for being in our lives. We will always remember and miss you.

# **Spring Report** by Clerk to the Council, Lisa Walker

As the clocks go forward, the bulbs are flowering, the birds are tweeting and the hum of busy lawn mowers has started to fill the air.

#### General Council Matters

Over the past few months, we have bid farewell to two of our number – Cllrs Kath Molloy and Stuart Chaston. We thank them for their work for the Council and wish them well with their future endeavours. Their resignations mean there are now 2 vacancies, which Council will look to fill in the near future.

In February, RCPC finalised its budget for 2016/17 and voted to keep its resultant precept at the same level as 2015/16 ie £70,000. RCPC has also set up a Staffing & Remuneration Committee to handle most staff-related matters, and make recommendations to Council as and when appropriate.

Council has reviewed and commented upon 14 planning applications since November. It has also submitted responses on consultations regarding the South West Trains Rail Franchise, SDNPA Local Plan Preferred Options and the Local Government Boundary Commission's Electoral Review of Hampshire.

#### Provision of defibrillators in the Parish

Since our last report, we are pleased to have gained further funding for this project. We have received contributions from the friends and family of the late Ian Edwards, whose daughter lives in the Parish, together with another donation from Rowlands Castle Association and a Community Grant from D Cllr Ken Moon.

This has enabled us to purchase 2 more defibrillators. With the kind permission of the landlord, one device has been installed at The George, Finchdean, and we are grateful to him for absorbing the costs of the power needed to keep it in 'tip top' condition. We hope to install the other device in the south of the Parish near the mini-roundabout system, once a precise location has been agreed.

South Central Ambulance Service's Defibrillator Awareness Session in early November at St John's Church Hall was well-attended, and residents were encouraged to use these devices if the need arises. Since then 1<sup>st</sup> Responder's Nick Poling has run 3 'hands on' courses in the Parish to train residents to use them in conjunction with CPR, which is vital when someone is in cardiac arrest.

The defibrillators are accessible anytime by phoning 999 and requesting the PIN code to unlock the cabinet. The British Heart Foundation urges people not to worry about any potential harm they might do to someone in cardiac arrest by conducting CPR; their life is already on the line so nothing you do is going to make it any worse and you might just save a life.

#### **Recreation Ground**

The excessive rainfall over recent months has meant many football matches have had to be postponed and rescheduled. We are grateful to the clubs for their patience and hope they are able to complete their seasons' fixtures now that the weather appears to be improving. The Recreation Ground Management Committee is also overseeing various treatments to improve the pitches, including the recent verti-draining of some pitches and the forthcoming weeding-and-feeding of the whole area.

The weather has also delayed the refurbishment of the original play equipment however we are confident this will now take place within the next month or so. The issues with the aerial cableway (otherwise known as the zip-wire) have now been addressed, though we have had to replace the seat several times in recent months (at £100 a time) because large chunks appear to have been gouged out of it!

Dog fouling is still a problem at the Rec and we urge dog owners/carers to clear up after their pooches so that Rec users can enjoy a safe and pleasant environment. If they fail to do so, they can be subject to fines.

#### **Traffic Review**

RCPC's Traffic Review for the Parish is virtually complete and should be available for publication in time for the Council's Meeting in May. The Council is very grateful to those involved (councillors and other local volunteers) for undertaking the comprehensive traffic studies of specific roads/areas within the Parish which have contributed so fundamentally to the Review. Once finalised, it will be submitted to the local MP, county and district councillors, and it is hoped it will have weight with local authorities.

#### **Forthcoming Projects**

After a lull in progress for several years, Portsmouth City Council has now offered RCPC a 50-year Lease on some of its land within the Parish (ie the allotments and grazing land off Durrants Road, and Whichers Gate Common). RCPC has appointed a solicitor to advise it and act on its behalf, and will keep residents informed of any significant developments.

RCPC has recently been promised 10 cycle racks by the SDNPA. It is currently seeking funding for their installation in Rowlands Castle village centre, subject to permission from the appropriate authority, and at the Recreation Ground.

It is also working on a range of circular walks and cycle rides, starting from the station, to encourage locals and visitors alike to enjoy the magnificent landscape in which we are fortunate to live. We hope to publish these routes in leaflet-form

and also on appropriate websites. After some delays, we will be working to form a Group to draft a Community Emergency Plan for the Parish, drawing on the experience of the highly effective RC Flood Action Group.

RCPC is also anticipating the launch of its new website within the next few months. The site will meet all legislative requirements, as well as aiming to be as user-friendly, informative and helpful as possible.

# **Spring Report** by Malcolm Johnson

As I write my latest report to the Village I can't help but wonder where has the time gone since my previous notes back in October last year.

At Penns Place in Petersfield, the home of East Hampshire District Council, events have been moving at quite a pace over the past months.

As many of you will have read in the local press both attempts at creating a new Combined Authority for the south of England have thus far failed to get over the starting line despite valiant efforts by various groups and individuals. The government is still very keen to have a "Southern Power House" to match the ones in the north like the Manchester proposal but so far there have been major stumbling blocks in the two southern bids as far as both the government and some of the contributing parties have been concerned. Elected mayors and increased housing numbers being just two of the items that have caused problems. Locally it is expected that a third attempt will be made later in the year, this time with an extended time scale for discussion rather than the very rushed process undertaken previously.

Within East Hampshire I'm now pleased to report that following a successful examination by the Planning Inspectorate the district's original housing numbers plan has been approved. This relieves the pressure on the district to come up with yet more housing allocations at least until 2028 although as sites do get developed over that period, future potential locations will need to be considered. By the time you receive this spring edition of the RCA magazine the new Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) process will be in operation. This is yet another piece of new legislation that has been introduced as part of the shake-up of the planning process that started some years back. CIL will largely replace the previous developer contributions process, known as S106 funds, which developers were required to pay to the district council as part of the planning process for the benefit of local communities. The new process will still raise funding from developers but rather than it being identified directly for a local community benefit, CIL contributions go into a central fund from which communities, i.e. parish councils can bid for funding for local projects.

This is a very simplified explanation of the new process which has been the subject of local public consultation earlier this year following approval by the Planning Inspectorate of EHDC's plans for the implementation of the new CIL regulations. There is much more detailed CIL information on the EHDC web site. While on the subject of planning I can now report that the major development project on the Hazelton and Pyle farm sites has finally been approved by all parties and it is anticipated that the first phase, the development of the care home and associated housing will be commenced later this year. This is the part of the site to the north of Rowlands Castle Road just south of Horndean. Being a member of the development panel for this project has enabled me along with others to gain significant benefits for the communities of both Rowlands Castle and Horndean, to be funded by the various developers of this major site.

Residents of Castle Road will be pleased to read that at last the provision of car parking for those living in Links Close is a finally in sight. Tenders have now been received that

fall within the budget and with some minor administrative details now being finalised work should get under way quite soon.

The continued placing of un-authorised advertisements on the road alongside the village green is now the subject of formal legal process by the Planning Enforcement team at EHDC.

I therefore have every expectation that this practice will cease very soon. In another part of the village the running of a business connected with the motor trade from a residential property is also under investigation by the same enforcement team.

You may recall that in my notes to the RCA back in October I mentioned the Councillor Grants Scheme which enables me to provide financial help to local projects within the village. Well I'm pleased to report that all my funding for the current financial year has been spent on a variety of projects within the village for the benefit of the wider community.

### Hampshire County Council report by Marge Harvey.

Dear Fellow residents,

At last the weather seems to be going towards summer and we can look forward to time in the garden, picnics and barbecues.

I have been quite busy since I last reported to you, with meetings and residents issues.

One of the most difficult meetings was in my health committee.

We were scrutinising the problems within Southern Health and believe me, there were many incidents of poor quality behaviour.

After about two hours of questioning, we asked that they come back to us in six months and report what they have done to improve the trust.

We do not have the power to dismiss the chief executive, but we do have the power to ask that the NHS looks into the problem and acts accordingly. This we have done and hope that we see a great improvement in the way the trust acts and that the Chief Executive is reprimanded or dismissed.

As a member of the regulatory committee, we oversee any planning applications that aren't housing. It did mean that we needed to go on a site visit to Somerset to visit an asphalt plant, as Hampshire want to build one in Micheldever so that they can repair roads and footpaths without buying in the materials, so saving money.

This committee is a very interesting one for me as I have always enjoyed the planning side of my job, but it also includes sitting on a committee of three when someone has been dismissed, for whatever reason and judging if the right decision has been made, which is quite a responsible position to be in, but it is very interesting. I have been asked to do two

of these so far, so although it includes someone's job, it also ensures that the right decision has been made.

On the subject of money, you no doubt will know that Hampshire needed to save £98 million to Close the gap between what the government no longer gives us and what it costs to keep the services the same for residents. This has been achieved by taking some money from reserves and making savings. Every year it seems to be an even larger amount, so we have to be very careful what we do with what we have and look to the future.

You may have already have seen in the press that the Government would like the Southern part of England to have a power house, the same as the North. Hampshire put in a bid, which included Portsmouth, Southampton, Fareham, Havant, Gosport, the Isle of Wight and many local authorities and also included East Hampshire, which of course would affect us. The one thing that Hampshire also didn't want was an elected Mayor as they saw it as another layer of bureaucracy and this was a sticking point with the Government.

At the same time a Solent bid was put forward, which included a Mayor. This is still in the melting pot, because Hampshire didn't want to join this bid as it would not include the whole of Hampshire and we didn't think, as Councillors, that it was the right thing to do, so we await the Government's decision, which will probably be before June. The outcome will always affect us, but I will let you all know which one has been decided upon and what it will mean to us as a village. I am worried that whatever happens, we will be asked to take more housing which I am against, but nothing has been decided yet.

I have been witness to the issues with the Parish Council and have been present throughout, as I give my report at their meetings, but I do not wish to get involved, as it is a Parish Council matter. Nevertheless, I do hope that for the sake of the Parish, that it gets resolved satisfactorily.

Lastly, I need to say that the traffic calming throughout the village I am told, will only happen with evidence of safety, so please let me know of any accidents or issues, so that I can log them.

I will continue to ask for traffic calming and anything else that I think the village needs but I do need your help so that I can report it to Hampshire officers for them to get something done, so please let me know if there is anything that is a problem.

You can also report potholes directly to Hampshire and will be given a number which you will be able to track.

I have asked for Castle Road and Woodberry Lane to be weight and width limit roads, as both of these roads have problems with heavy lorries and in Castle Road, with cars parked on one side and also with no clear edge on the other and Woodberry Lane being very narrow, they do need to be limited. This has already been accepted and will hopefully be done this financial year.

As usual, if there is anything that I can help with, please let me know or come and visit me at the cafe in the village on the first Thursday of every month, where both Malcolm Johnson and I look forward to seeing you.

I hope you have a lovely Summer and as always look forward to seeing you around the village.



# Three Sheets to the Wind Frank Philpot

**B** ermuda rigged sailing boats have a fore sail and a main sail that run fore and aft. Ropes called sheets connecting the sails to the boat.

There are two sheets on the fore sail which pull the bottom of the sail either to the left or right and one which holds the main sail down connected to the boom. If all of these ropes are not attached to the boat then the sails are out of control.

The sail can shake violently so the ropes and the boom become dangerous to the sailors on deck.

So being 'three sheets the wind' means to be out of control and staggering about in a mad senseless fashion.

Ropes are called sheets because they control the sails which are sheets and so the misnomer is justified by fast communication.

Mathematicians however are too clever by half when they slip in a change of meaning just to get the right answer.

For example Pythagorus theorem states 'The square of the hypotenuse of a right angled triangle is equal to the sum of the squares of the two remaining sides'.

$$h^2 = x^2 + y^2$$

Here the square of a number means the result obtained when the number is multiplied by itself ( $^2$ ). So two times two is four, so four is the square of two and two is the square root of four. The area of a flat rectangular surface is calculated by multiplying its length by the breadth.

Multiplying two lengths that are at right angles to each other gives a result that is equal to the area of the square. This area points at right angles to the both of the sides.

When proving the Pythagorus theorem the length of the sides of the triangle are multiplied by themselves, but in this case the same length pointing in the same direction is used for both multiplicands so the area inclosed is zero. One can not say that for the Pythagoras Theorem proof, it is OK to use the magnitude of the lengths, because all the proves rely on adding areas.

Starting from the well known equation for distance in four dimensions :-

$$s^2 = (ct)^2 - x^2 - y^2 - z^2$$
.

Here the distance in the fourth dimension of space 's' is given by time 't' multiplied by the speed of light 'c'. The sign  $^2$  means multiplied by itself, and x, y and z are distances from a reference or starting point in three directions in space that are at right angles to each other, like length, breadth and thickness.

To understand how this equation works, we have to choose the fourth dimension 'ct' as the reference direction, because the three other directions have to be treated in the same way making the fourth dimension is the odd one out. Now we have to rotate the spacial directions from the reference direction. To do this we have to imagine operators i,j,k, that will turn the reference direction through a right angle into the chosen x,y,z directions.

Multiplying any of the spatial distances ix, jy or kz by itself will create a product that is rotated through another right angle to turning each of them into the negative reference direction. If time is involved the positive reference direction remains positive when

multiplied by itself. We now have all the products pointing in the same direction, so they can be added together and the resulting distance square rooted to give the length of the hypotenuse.

If the result of the addition is negative then the hypotenuse of the object is measured in metres in three dimensional space. If the addition gives a positive result so the distance is measured in metres in the fourth dimension and so we have to divide it by the speed of light to change it into time measured in seconds, which is how we appreciate the fourth dimension of space. So Pythagoras theorem is proven!

Fermat's last theorem says that :-  $r^n=x^n+y^n$  only if n=2

Proof of Fermat's last theorem was left as a marginal note for mathematicians to ponder over for centuries. Eventually Andrew Wiles found a very complex proof which was obviously not the simple proof envisaged by Fermat.

My proof works for numbers of any size, not just integers.

The proof is simply one sentence. Both spacial distances inherently have right angle operators, so only multiplying spacial distances by themselves (raising to the power 2) will make all the products to point in the same reference direction where they can be added together and the result square rooted to give the radial distance 'r'.

I tried putting these and other ideas to a scientific forum and was treated to a moronic tirade by trolls who not only rubbished what I said without any word of justification but also arranged for the records of the conversation to destroy themselves as soon as they were opened. So in my opinion the scientists who are paid by us to contend with these issues are 'Three sheets to the wind'.

# The Beast of Hayling Island? Or just a harmless wild cat that lost its way?

Visitors to The Spring Arts and Heritage Centre may wonder if their eyes are deceiving them – an exotic beast can now be found lurking in the Museum.

But this is no creature from foreign parts – it was discovered on Hayling Island as recently as 1988. In a glass case, stuffed and mounted, is the amazing

'Swamp Cat' – sadly killed by a car in West Lane, Hayling Island. How it came to be there is a complete mystery, as the species normally found in Lower Egypt, through the Middle East to most of Asia.

The Swamp Cat (or 'Jungle Cat' or 'Reed Cat') is common in parts of India, and lives on a variety of small mammals and birds. It has adapted well to the presence of hu-



mans, and in its native habitat can often be found around towns and villages.

What was the exotic feline doing in the South of England? Sightings and photographic evidence would suggest that quite a few of them are living feral in this country, and could well account for at least some of the reported sightings of 'big cats'. Presumably, our Swamp Cat escaped from someone's private collection. And it may not be the last, as there have been other tantalising sightings on Hayling before and since.

Residents of Hayling Island have a definite affection for their Swamp Cat, which until recently was kept at the Hampshire County Museum Service store at Chilcomb House, Winchester, where it could be visited for purposes of research. Now, however, it can be seen at The Spring Arts and Heritage Centre in Havant – in good shape after the first attempt at taxidermy was later revised to produce the fine specimen now on display.

Sophie Fullerlove, Director of The Spring, says: "We are delighted that we have been given permission to bring the Swamp Cat to join our Museum collection, and hope that as many people as possible will take the opportunity to come and see this amazing exhibit."

With its appealing face and fine golden eyes, the Hayling Island Swamp Cat is no terrifying beast – just an intriguing visitor from foreign parts who ended up in Hampshire.

With the ever increasing pressure to be as green as you can be, there is the basic option of simply adding thermostatic valves to your radiators, which I've mentioned previously. There's also a wider range of heating controls available than ever before, from a simple room thermostat to the more sophisticated weather compensating controls. They are all capable of reducing your carbon footprint and most of all your bills. The Energy Saving Trust has recently reported that simply fitting the correct heating controls could cut up to 23 per cent off a heating bill. For more from them please visit their website.

Even if you choose to do none of the above, I would highly recommend that you switch your heating on for just a few minutes a couple of times over the summer. This helps prevent diverter valves, pumps and other mechanical parts seizing up from lack of use, so causing a major panic just when you need it most. After all, the inner workings of these items are always submerged in water. Without movement seizing is inevitable. We wouldn't be surprised if a car left for a long period of time wasn't raring to go. Hope you all have a good spring.

# **Progress After Year One** by Alan Drinkwater



Progress with the Rowlands Castle Heritage Centre is gathering pace. We would like to update you, and invite you to help, to participate and to contribute to this project.

It began when the Rowlands Castle Association was offered for

£8,000, an iconic and acclaimed model railway of the Village Green and Station set at the time of the Normandy Landings in 1944.

A Working Group of the RCA was formed to consider the offer and set about searching for a suitable place to house the model. Various venues were considered. The former station master's accommodation over the railway station appeared of most interest being at a peppercorn rent, but only on a short lease of one year. The Working Group has now deferred negotiations pending an offer of a longer lease, dependent in turn on an announcement of the next franchise holder. The current SW Trains franchise expires at the end of 2016.

When reviewing progress of the Heritage Centre, the Working Group decided to begin with a website or 'virtual museum', to demonstrate that archive and research material already donated was being used to good effect, and to achieve a higher profile.

In addition to earlier articles in this Magazine, public meetings have been held to provide information about the Centre, and to consult on research 'themes'. They also discussed the Centre's operation, its activities, funding, management and organisation. The local Museum Development Service for South Hampshire has been contacted.

#### **NEXT STEPS**

An Inaugural General Meeting will eventually be held to approve a constitution, management and supervisory structures and propose officers. A bank account will then be opened.

Discussions have begun to seek opportunities to work with the Stansted Foundation on display space and research.

#### THE Website or VIRTUAL MUSEUM

Drawing on the RCA's own experience, a meeting of local computer experts has discussed the website, and advised on hardware and software, and the social media.

We wish to thank Cllrs Marge Harvey and Malcolm Johnson for making grants from their devolved funds, to cover the initial costs of the hardware, software, and installation.

Booklets, photos and artefacts about the Village, the Brickworks, sites of Roman villas, recent Parish Plans, and audio recordings, have already been offered.

### THE FIRST RESEARCH THEME: THE BRICK-WORKS

Work has also begun on Research Themes which will be promoted through the RCA Magazine. These include: 'the Village Name', the Brick Works, the D-Day Landings, the 'High Woods' Project (a South Downs Park project based on a LIDAR survey of the Downs), and comparisons between 'The three large local Estates' – Idsworth, Stansted and Staunton - or the four local churches, for example.

The Brickworks is proposed as the first theme as fewer workers remain, and photos and artefacts become less available. The brickworks closed in 1967, and once stood on the Keyline Site.

The research will be based on a booklet to be published later this year, written by local resident Jonathan Dicks, which describes local brickmaking. He has also written about roman pottery making.

We would appreciate any further information that you may have about the brickworks – photos, maps, bills etc. - and names of those who worked there. Please contact:

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#### St Hubert's Church



#### The Mysterious Windows of St Hubert's Church by John Bates

Windows have always been a main feature of our churches. From the massive stained glass representations of saint and miracles depicted in the windows of our cathedrals to the modern abstract glass in many of our newer churches. All have their place and their own unique beauty.

In our **Church of St. Hubert**, Idsworth we have only one small round stained glass panel above the altar. This may seem strange for a church built on a hill and exposed to the full light of sun, moon and stars but the reason is clear when you sit in the church through the seasons. It doesn't need stained glass. Through the clear glass windows we see the clouds in all their moods, the trees and the woods, ever changing with the seasons, the birds and butterflies as they pass by. Planes and helicopters remind us of the man made as well as the natural world.



Our one small stained glass roundel is often missed and can easily be overlooked being high up above the altar but it has an interesting story to tell. The window was a gift from Mr. H.S.Goodhart-Rendel, the architect in charge of the renovation of the church in 1913. During this renovation the organ was moved to its present position and a new vestry added, and our little window installed. The design is based on an engraving by **Albrecht Durer**, a German artist and son of a goldsmith. From the age of 13 it was clear he had a unique talent and in 1486 his father apprenticed him to a painter and woodcut artist, Michael Wohlgemut. After just three years he left and travelled widely, working as a journeyman engraver and woodcut illustrator.

Returning to Nuremberg in 1494 he married and became a prodigious artist using mainly cool, sombre colours many of his pieces depicting religious and military themes. His picture of St. Eustace (often erroneously

mistaken for St. Hubert) was completed in 1501 and was his largest copper engraving. A copy is hung next to the vestry door. It shows the saint out hunting with his hounds and horse when he comes upon a stag with a crucifix between its antlers. The rest of the legend I recounted in the last RCA magazine. It is said that Durer was so proud of this work that he would only give away copies as presents or sell them when he was short of money.

Our own stained glass roundel is based on this painting. The saint with his horse and hounds have been reposed to fit and one other addition made which is missed by most visitors to our church. *Just in front of the horses head (arrowed) is a representation of* **our church**. I wonder



how many of you have noticed that. Take a close look on your next visit.

Another mystery window is situated in the north wall. A small slit window set between the other two windows. It has been suggested that it was a "Lazar" window for lepers to see in to the service but at that height they would have had to be very tall lepers. Any suggestions?

#### Poppy Appeal

Once again we had a very successful Poppy Appeal last November for the Legion. Our street collectors (who got very wet) made £590, and as always the village shops, Post Office, Surgery, Pharmacy, pubs as well as Whichers Gate garage and the Golf club looked after the collecting boxes and contributed in a big way.

### **Does Greening Matter?** by: Helen Penfold

Yes – Lots of us think Greening does matter, and some of us have formed a greening group in the village, following the formation of greening groups across the country. The greening movement is working to promote the idea that if each of us saves small amounts of energy, then together we can make significant energy savings and raise national awareness as to the potential for change. This is particularly relevant after the recent World Climate Change Conference, held in Paris in December 2015, where real progress was made towards global responsibility for change.

In November we delivered a greening challenge card to everyone who receives the RCA magazine, asking you all to place the card in your window, if you were able to commit to five or more of the challenges listed.

A big Thank You to everyone who put up their cards. We were not able to count the cards until January, when we counted 50 cards, and another 16 people emailed us to say they had put the cards up, but had taken them down before we counted them. This figure represents approximately 5% of the 1300 houses in Rowlands Castle and the surrounding area. We had hoped for a bigger response, as other greening groups had had positive responses of up to 70% of people putting up their cards, and we have to ask ourselves why our venture was not more successful. We are conscious that Christmas, the delay in counting the cards, or possibly, residents' lack of interest or even feeling that the cards were inappropriate may all have contributed to the poor response.

BUT, even these 66 families committing to making five of the simple changes suggested, will save a significant amount of money, energy and /or water. If the 66 families committed to the first five challenges, they will save £71 per dwelling and £4,686 between them. They will save 329 kg of CO2 emissions per dwelling and between them they will save 21,714 kg of CO2 being pumped into our atmosphere, in one year! If everyone in the village was able to commit to these very simple changes, then in one year, we could save £93,720 between us, and prevent 434,280 kg CO2 being pumped into the atmosphere. Opting for some of the other challenges on the greening card could save up to £185,000 in the village and reduce CO2 emissions by up to 962,000 kg in one year!

That's a lot of saving from very little individual effort- just in Rowlands Castle! I am staggered by these figures, and I hope you are too ----- enough to think about joining in with the commitment. Little things make a big difference.

Did you know that Portsmouth Water board are happy to supply, free, a 'Save@flush' bag to put into your toilet cistern which will save 1.2 litres of wa-

ter, every time you flush the toilet, saving around 11 litres per day, and 4,000 litres per year. It will save you money too – if you have a water meter. The water board will install a meter for free, and remove it again, a year later, if it doesn't save you money. The water board website has other useful tips on saving water.


We plan to have another public meeting in May so that anyone who is interested can come and find out more.

#### Hints on keeping your home warm in winter

Members of the Greening group wanted to offer something that could help villagers save money and avoid wasting energy through too much heat escaping from their houses. We borrowed an infra-red camera from Winchester Action on Climate Change (WINACC), and carried out brief exterior surveys of eighteen

houses, arranged via a Grapevine message. These revealed that heat was most often escaping through windows and doors (and their frames) rather than walls. The images also showed that the most modern glazing (such as triple glazing) could significantly prevent heat loss.

Golf lessons at the golf club cost £15 for half an hour, and we also do a course of 6 lessons for £75, with many people spreading this cost by learning with a friend. As well as the ladies taster clinics we also run a number of other free taster sessions as well as the subsidised 'couch to 5 holes' series of group lessons throughout the year for everyone, with details of these appearing on Peter's website which has address: <a href="www.peterklepaczgolfshop.com">www.peterklepaczgolfshop.com</a>.

Beginners can start by simply wearing trainers and comfortable clothes and we will provide you with all the equipment you need. Golf can also bring a great social life and Rowlands Castle is a very friendly club with an active social section. As a club we welcome golfers of all abilities and aspirations, whether you want to play weekly competitive golf, or a friendly 9 holes followed by a social drink in the club house. Throughout the golfing season, starting with the AGM cup in March and finish-



ing with the Quaffers presentation night in October there are weekly competitions, which are keenly contested, along with matches against other clubs both competitive and friendly. We also have very strong Ladies and Seniors sections who both have busy and varied golfing diaries, and provide plenty of opportunities to get involved. Golf and the golf club are a great way to meet new people and get involved in village life, especially if you have just moved to the area.

The club is very proud of their active junior section, and along with many internal junior competitions we enter teams in a number of local leagues and host friendly matches, with the emphasis very much on participation and enjoyment. We are actively trying to increase the numbers of junior golfers and throughout the year hold clinics on a Sunday morning, with the dates and times of these also appearing on Peter's website.













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
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

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
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
