MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

By the time you read this I hope we will have said goodbye to winter and Spring will be properly here.

At the Rowlands Castle Association AGM in February we were pleased to report that we had given a total of £11,290.80 in donations to Rowlands Castle affiliated clubs and causes over the year. Do read the AGM Minutes (posted in the RCA notice board) if you would like more details of the donations and our events over the past year.

As I write, the annual litter pick is about to take place. Following this, I would like to start a monthly litter pick in Rowlands Castle that will be self organised. I propose that anyone wishing to participate meets at the flagpole on The Green at 10.30 on the last Saturday of each month. Individuals bring their own equipment to collect litter (ie bags, pickers, gloves, hi vis vests etc as you feel necessary). Participants agree where they will pick and take the collected litter home to recycle or put in their own rubbish bin. A Grapevine reminder will be sent out a week before each litter pick. So, the first litter pick would be Saturday 28th April. Please let me know your thoughts about this proposal.

There is a lot of publicity at the moment about plastic. It would be wonderful if Rowlands Castle could do something to reduce our plastic usage. I will get in touch with other towns/ villages that have plastic free status and

/ PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

SPRING REPORT

After the unseasonably cold spell in early March it's good to see to see the Parish blossom with the arrival of Spring. Whilst the flood alleviation measures were not needed this winter, we remain grateful to the Flood Action Group for its hard work to ensure ditches remain clear year-on-year.

Electoral Review of East Hants District by the Local Govt Boundary Commission for England

Whilst supporting the proposed inclusion of Finchdean, Idsworth and surrounding areas in the Ward of Rowlands Castle, RCPC objected to the Commission's proposals to include parts of Horndean as well with representation by 2 district cllrs. When the Commission made further proposals for a 'mega-Ward' to include even more of Horndean with Rowlands Castle. and representation by 3 district cllrs, RCPC objected even more strongly. We emphasised that Rowlands Castle (including Finchdean, Idsworth etc) has a strong sense of community and does not identify with Horndean in any meaningful way; therefore the proposals were unrepresentative and unworkable. Council's responses can be viewed on our website and we await the Commission's decision in early April.

'Oaklands II' and Land East of College Close

The Council continues to monitor progress at both sites, bringing issues to the attention of other bodies as and when necessary. Regular liaison meetings between Bellway and local representatives have helped communication

with residents though we acknowledge Whichers Gate Road and Redhill Road are likely to experience disruption for some time with utility works etc. We are also emphasising the need for Bargate to restore Bridleway 24 to its 'former glory' when it reopens in the coming months. The entrance from the Keyline driveway was considerably improved a few years ago using £10K of developers contributions and we would hate to see that money go to waste. Please keep an eye on our Facebook page for further updates with respect to both these sites. We have also flagged our concerns about inconsistencies in various applications for advertising signage at both sites to EHDC. We are endeavouring to ensure that any such signage is proportionate and in keeping with the street scene.

Developers' Contributions and other Planning Matters

We continue to stress that these should be spent in as 'joined up' a way as possible, with maximum possible consultation with local residents, particularly where transport contributions are concerned. We are particularly anxious that satisfactory measures are put in place to help Whichers Gate Road/ the mini-roundabout system/Manor Lodge Road cope with the significant increase in traffic anticipated from developments in north Emsworth and East of Horndean, as well as those within this Parish. The Government's enthusiasm for house-building must be balanced with adequate infrastructure to support such new dwellings. We look to our local district and county cllrs for their assistance in these matters and please note a Council representative now attends their monthly surgeries on the first Thursday of the month in the café from 11am to 12 Noon.

We also anticipate significant contributions being available for community facilities and



have received expressions of interest in these from St John's Church, RC Scout Hut, the Church on The Green, RC Heritage Centre and St Hubert's Church, Idsworth. Each of these will be invited to give a 5-minute presentation on their project to the Annual Parish Meeting (APM) and its value to the community. Although RCPC doesn't have the final say on the use of these funds, we can influence the spending of them and we'd really like to know how local residents feel about these projects as well, so do come along to the APM at 7pm on 23 April.

Finchdean and Trees

We are pleased to see the bench on Finchdean Green has been replaced and the wooden 'dragons teeth' installed to prevent unauthorised parking. The Speed Limit Reminder devices now have 2 additional locations on Finchdean Green and Finchdean Road.

We are implementing a plan of works to ensure all the recommendations of last year's tree surveys are undertaken by mid-2019. As previously advised, we are also planning to allow the grass to grow longer around various trees in the Parish (e.g. on the Deerleap verge) to protect their base and root system from machinery damage and encourage flora and fauna. We'll review this policy at the end of this grass growing season.

General Council Matters & Dates for Your Diary

We welcome Peter Cross as a newly co-opted member of the Council. By the time you read this, we also hope to have filled the remaining vacancy so we can be back up to 'full strength' of 9 cllrs.

After large year's substantial increase in RCPC's precept, we are going for a more modest increase of 4.9% for 2018-19, which includes provision of over £3,000 to compensate for the cessation of EHDC's Support Grant. This will enable us to tackle further traffic management and pedestrian safety issues, provide sufficient funding for the second half of the Neighbourhood Plan development, reserve funds for potential expert transport advice and fund more frequent rubbish bin clearance.

I would encourage you all to come along to the Annual Parish Meeting on 23 April in the Parish Hall. Please make time to read the minutes of the monthly Council meetings if you want to keep up to date with what's going on in the Parish – see the Council's website and/or local noticeboards.

Our website also contains lots of information on the work of the Council as well as local events and history. If there's a particular event you'd like promoted on the website and/or on the Parish Council's Facebook page, please let us know.

NOTES FROM EHDC

By the time you are reading this spring edition of the RCA magazine you will have received you council tax demand for the 2018 -2019 tax year. I hope that you noticed that East Hampshire District Council has not increased its share of the total bill this time with a nil increase. Despite increases in costs to EHDC like the rise in the minimum wage plus the removal of the freeze on council staff salaries, the council has managed to produce a balanced budget which has resulted in their element of the tax not increasing. This has been achieved by the council through internal cost efficiencies, selling services and successful results from their investments in commercial property. This last point is worth mentioning because it is a further demonstration of how EHDC is moving forward in its aim of removing the need for their element in the annual local council tax demand that falls on every household. The EHDC commercial property portfolio is an actively managed portfolio run by a combination of experienced council officers, knowledgeable local councillors with an appropriate commercial background, together with support from national industry leading companies with relevant experience in the commercial property sector. This is producing genuine positive income for the council to add to its other financial income streams, helping to replace the loss of central government grants. We expect to see a continuation of this policy with the addition to the portfolio of more income generating properties in the near future.

With the prime minister's recent statements on the continuing need for more housing coupled with forthcoming changes to the National Planning Policy Framework document which is the planners "bible" EHDC has started work on its next Local Plan. You may recall that back in 2014 the council published a five year Joint Core Strategy document which set out a local planning development policy for East Hampshire and the South Downs National Park. That local plan is due to expire in May 2019. The Local Plan that is now being worked on, and will supersede the previous version, will just be for the area of East Hampshire outside the Park. A separate plan is being produced by the National Park. As yet it is too soon to say what the local consequences will be for Rowlands Castle but I have been asked to join the team working on the new Plan so I will be able to report back in due course. Needless to say the continuing work by the Rowlands Castle Neighbour Hood Plan team will be most important as eventually the Neighbour Hood Plan will become part of the much bigger East Hampshire wide Local Plan. For East Hampshire, and all its local communities, it is essential that a new development plan is produced in a timely manner so that the district does not become prey to speculative developers wishing to capitalise on a district without a robust Local Plan.

Recent reports of changes to water extraction licenses for local water companies such as





Southern Water have once again highlighted the need for the long postponed Havant Thicket Winter Storage Reservoir to become a reality. Well Portsmouth Water is now well on its way to realising its long-held view of the need for the reservoir and has started to update its original work on the scheme with a view to the facility being in service by 2026. At a stakeholder briefing back in late 2017 the company came forward with a new timetable for the reservoir as Southern Water has now made clear that it will he in need of additional water resources

much soon than previously thought. Water companies now have a duty to co-operate in sharing water resources so Portsmouth Water will be doing just that with the Havant Thicket scheme. There are a number of stages to be completed before construction work actually starts but the process is now back on track so watch this space!

As in previous years once again I will have funds available from May under the Councillor Grant scheme which is designed to help local groups seeking financial assistance for a particular scheme. Go to the EHDC web site and download the forms and when complete just get in touch and I'll put your requests forward.

And finally please remember that on the first Thursday of each month along with our Hampshire County Councillor Marge Harvey and a representative from the Rowlands Castle Parish Council, I can be found in the village café between 1100 and 1200. VIP VISIT TO WHITEHILL & BORDON

Whitehill & Bordon recently welcomed a special visitor when HM Lord-Lieutenant of Hampshire was given a tour of the town.

The Lord-Lieutenant, Mr Nigel Atkinson, is HM The Queen's personal representative in Hampshire and has a special interest in the development of sustainable communities.

Mr Atkinson met with Cllr Ferris Cowper, EHDC's Portfolio Holder for Whitehill & Bordon, who explained the work being undertaken in the town.

His tour, on Tuesday 13 February, included some of the fantastic new facilities recently delivered in the town, including the BASE Bordon Innovation Centre, the Future Skills Centre, the Tech Forest and the new relief road. He was also shown the site of the exciting new town centre with plans for new retail, leisure, entertainment and office buildings submitted to East Hampshire District Council.

The tour finished at Quebec Park to see the town's Community Enterprise Hub at Chieftain House and some of the new high-quality homes built as part of the town's regeneration.

Cllr Ferris Cowper, EHDC Portfolio Holder for Whitehill & Bordon, said: "I was thrilled to have the chance to show the Lord-Lieutenant of

IBM JOINS EHDC TO CREATE 'SMART' TOWN

Global technology giant IBM is joining forces with East Hampshire District Council and the Whitehill & Bordon Regeneration Company to turn Whitehill & Bordon into a 'smart' town.

The new collaboration will bring state-of-theart technology to the town and change the way people interact with their homes, with each other, their community and local services.

The partnership plans to design solutions in the following areas:

COUNCIL REPORT

I think that for information, I should explain the increase in council tax agreed by the full council earlier this month.

The government allowed us to increase our part of the council tax by 5.99% of which 3.99% is towards social care and the other 2% is towards all other services. I really don't think that this will close the gap for social care, but at least it will help.

I am aware that potholes are an issue at the moment and has been made worse by the snow and cold temperatures. I have been assured that they will be dealt with very soon and that HCC have more teams out and about to solve this very important issue. If you see any really deep ones please go online to HCC and report them and they will be dealt with first. Failing that, you can always contact me and I will report them.

The devolved authority is now back on the agenda, but without a mayor, which is why we decided at Hampshire not to take it forward last time, so watch this space and I will report on how it is going in the future.

It has been a very busy time since Christmas with all of the committees that I sit on. I have been asked to be vice chairman of the Children and Young People Select Committee, of which I am a member. As you can imagine, it is a very important committee which deals with every part of children and young people's lives. I feel very honoured to have been asked and look forward to helping bring important issues to the committee.

I am also a member of the Health and Social Care Select Committee which, as you can imagine is a very busy committee, trying to make the most of the money that we have and holding hospitals and health trusts to account for their actions.

I am also on the regulatory committee, which oversees building and extensions of schools, new firms that are taking waste and recycling it and footways etc. This committee makes visits to all of these sites so we can make informed decisions about applications.

The other committee that I am on and in my view, a very import one, is the Autism

Partnership Board, where we discuss all issues to do with Autism and disablement and try to make a difference to these very vulnerable people.

Only 16% of Autistic people work and we are trying to make companies understand that there are many Autistic people who would be an asset to their companies. We do have Proctor and Gamble as a brilliant employer of Autistic people, who make it so much easier for these vulnerable people to apply and be interviewed in the right setting that takes the stress out of this for all of Autistic people, as this is something that really does affect them for applying for work.

I am also on two working groups which delve into why certain things happen for residents and how to help sort them out.

So, as you can see, I am kept very busy, but I really love being able to make a difference to people's lives and help where I can.

I am taking a training course to be an Autism Ambassador which will enable me to train firms and organisations about Autism and have already spoken to people about taking the training and want to be able to make our village at least, be Autism aware.

I am always available to speak to and if not I will always get back to you and there is, as always my surgery, which is attended by the Parish and the District Councillors, so you now have a one stop shop to answer all of your question.

Please remember the 1st Thursday of every month at 11am.

PHARMACY CHANGES OWNERSHIP

More than 100,000 people signed an online petition given the threat to their local pharmacies viability, including many Rowlands Castle patients challenging the government cutbacks, but unfortunately it was to no avail, the cutbacks stood and were implemented over the past three months. As a consquence over the past few months dozens of pharmacies in Hampshire have unfortunately had to close down, including established pharmacies in Hayling Island and Bedhampton. No pharmacy it seems is immune. All we can do is ask for the village support and ask residents to utilise us as their first port of call for their healthcare and toiletries needs, over the larger supermarkets and help sustain the long term future of this pharmacy in Rowlands Castle.

We will provide a number of vital NHS services to all patients including a free home delivery service, free electronic prescription service, free Medicines Use Reviews, free New Medicines Services, Private Prescriptions, Free Blister Pack Medication, Care Home Services, Travel medications and stocking a wide range of healthcare and toiletry products including mobility & incontinence aids and compression hoiseries. We will try and provide a broad range of services and support the residents with their needs, even ordering bespoke items on a next day service- that a number of residents have already taken advantage of. We have already expanded the range of products we stock to great feedback.



We will aim to continue to work closely with the Practice Manager, Nurses, Receptionists and GP's at the practice to ensure all patients are provided the best possible care at all times and will continue to work symbiotically with the practice everyday and support the outstanding service the surgery already provides to its patients. We have forged an excellent relationship already and our continued colloboration looking after the healthcare of Rowlands Castle residents we feel will be of immense benefit to the village.

/ ROWLANDS CASTLE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

PROGRESS REPORT

Since the last edition of this magazine the Rowlands Castle Neighbourhood Plan (RCNP) Steering Group (SG) has continued to meet monthly to develop the Plan.

In early December a workshop was held - to clarify and agree the "vision" for the Plan and to outline key objectives based on this vision. It was well attended by the members of the

Steering Group and by others who have volunteered their time to the project.

From this, the agreed "VISION" for the Rowlands Castle Neighbourhood Plan is:

"To conserve and enhance the Parish of Rowlands Castle as an attractive community, whilst maintaining its separate identity, character and distinctiveness."


The key (planning) policy areas and objectives, identified by the workshop, broadly confirmed those previously identified, i.e. those to be covered by the Working Groups (WGs) – reported in the last edition of this magazine.

The target for the WGs is now to draft broad or outline policies and to identify the key issues and areas where work needs to be focussed. The Parish Council is being kept regularly updated on progress and issues.

But, recently, a problem has arisen because the government has changed its planning policy - including about how new housing requirements are to be assessed and about the need to review all Local Plans (LPs) every 5 years! East Hampshire District Council (EHDC) consider that their existing LP will therefore be out of date from May 2019 and that the new one might not be adopted until late 2020. EHDC has asked that we (and other EHDC parishes whose NP is at an early stage of preparation) suspend, or extend the timescale for, our NP development until their new LP is nearing completion.

However, because of concern about the possibility of there being no cogent planning policy in place for about 18 months from May 2019 (to enable a defence against any speculative developers' plans in the period between the old and new LPs), the SG has sought independent advice. The advice so far received is that we can and should continue with our NP to hopefully have something in place by (or soon after) May 2019.

It will require much more effort to achieve this challenging programme and close liaison with EHDC will be even more important. So, if you feel that you could help the Steering Group (currently 2 vacancies including the post of 'Finance Officer) or any of the Working Groups – e.g. in drafting parts of the NP, or helping to collect evidence– please do contact Gill Whatley at the Parish Council Office for further information.

The Staunton Country Park takes its name from one of the most illustrious owners of the former Leigh Park Estate, namely Sir George Thomas Staunton, Bt. Staunton acquired the then Leigh Estate of 828 acres in December 1819 for the sum of £22,000 from the previous owner, William Garrett.

Garrett can rightly claim the honour of originally establishing the estate. In 1800 he acquired the relatively small Leigh estate of a modest sized villa and 22 acres of land. Over the next nineteen years he acquired all the freehold and copyhold land around his small estate enlarging it to over 800 acres. Over the ensuing years gardens and parkland were established, and the house enlarged in 1802, making the Leigh Estate the largest in the neighbourhood.

When Sir George Staunton bought the estate in December 1819 he acquired an estate that was well established, but it was Staunton over the next thirty years or more who went on to create this splendid Regency Garden and Parkland, admired by all who came to visit.

In creating this wonderful garden and parkland Staunton had the help of the architect Lewis Vuliamy, who designed a series of over 25 follies and garden structures as well as designing and building various cottages and lodges.

The glory of Staunton's gardens, apart from the walled garden and the glasshouses, was Leigh Water, the ornamental lake which Staunton

created over a period of eight years. Around the lake were follies, statues, and a series of

bridges which linked the various islands.

Leigh Park under Sir George Staunton can be best summed up by Sir George himself, in his memoirs in 1856 he writes: 'The situation is healthy; the views, including that of the sea, are beautiful; and although the mansion is of a modest size, and the park not large, the character of the property has been much raised

The glory of Staunton's gardens, apart from the walled garden and the glasshouses, was Leigh Water, the ornamental lake which Staunton created over a period of eight years.

by the addition of a handsome Gothic library, by the construction of numerous hot-houses and conservatories, famed for the successful cultivation of rare flowers and exotic fruits, and by the very great extension of the pleasure grounds, generally admired for their picturesque views and various decorations.'

The above is just a small fragment of the incredible history of the estate and the wonderful park and gardens created by Staunton. Over the next three years, thanks to a Lottery funded programme, the Regency gardens under Sir George Staunton are going to be re-created. A series of programmes will transfer the landscape of the northern gardens to the gardens of how they were during the Regency period. Some of the follies, which still stand will be carefully renovated and new carparking and a heritage centre and café will be opened in the Coachhouse and stable block. William Stone's mansion, the house that was built overlooking the lake, after Staunton's death in 1859 will also be highlighted.



WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Asked if I had any ideas or names for the roads on the new estate called Oaklands II by the planners, or Montague estate by the developers, I remembered my ideas for Oaklands had been dismissed. Nevertheless I gave it my best.

Firstly I queried what Romeo or Juliet had to do with it and then pointed out that Dearleap Close would be better suited to a future development that would indeed be closer to the footpath cum bridleway.

St John's Close sounds good, the church and school are both nearby. Historically the area was East Durrants (well not that historicaly, within living memory of some). Why not I suggested, call the whole estate East Durrants? Numbering the houses from 1 to whatever (106 is it for now?). HEROINES OF THEIR OWN STORY

One crisp Sunday morning in February, the Rural Refugee Network held their annual fundraising 'Walk for Hope'. This year a number of Syrian refugees joined the walk through the West Sussex countryside - a far cry from the war torn cities they once called home. The walk followed the same route as last year, through Elsted village, a climb to Elsted Hanger, along South Downs Way, down through Treyford before returning to Elsted Village Hall.

Five years ago Larisa never thought she would leave Syria, till her town was razed to the ground in the course of just one day. Forced to seek asylum in Jordan the family were eventually assessed under the Vulnerable Persons Relocation Scheme (VPRS) and arrived in Gatwick with just one bag and their memories. Larissa is now studying Biology, Chemistry and Maths, determined to qualify in medicine and return to her own country.

At the start of the Syrian war Rasha and her family fled with few possessions in a backpack. Rasha wondered if she could study there, she was a good student, but there was no school, or even healthcare, in the camp. This was life for the next five years till they received a call saying the RRN had found a home and they would be moving to the UK. One day Rasha hopes to return to Syria to open an orphanage



and rebuild her country. 'This is my future,' she says, before asking for a moments silence for all those who have died in Syria.

Upon hearing the girls speak first-hand, these victims of war but heroines of their own story, volunteers at RRN feel ever more compelled to continue their work. OUR VILLAGE AT A CROSSROAD

The Past:

The Romans made brick, tiles and pottery at Rowlands Castle because suitable clay was available. Next came the Saxons, their 7th century graves have been found near Stansted House. Through the centuries Rowland Castle remained a small, quiet village on the edge of the Forest of Bere. There was a castle by the village, built early 12th century, that fell into disuse by the 14th century and thereafter into ruins. Named Rowlands Castle because of the Castle, although possibly a corruption of much older Celtic words?

By the 18th century it was known for smuggling and poaching. Population about 120 inhabitants. Also Gypsies lived near nearby in The Thicket, giving their name to Gypsies Plain and Gypsies Clump. Rowlands Castle also had two fairs, held in May and November where cattle and horses were sold, ending late 19th century.

Richard Lumley built a mansion at Stansted in 1686. The Avenue was probably laid out at that time. However the house was destroyed by fire in 1900 and had to be replaced. The Parish Church of St John was built in 1838, architect Jacob Owen. In mid-19th century a school was created by St Johns Church and A United Reformed Church was built in 1881.

The Present:

Rowlands Castle grew when a railway was built from Portsmouth to London in 1859. A small station was built in the village allowing people to commute. In 1852 a wine merchant named Charles Dixon built an almshouse for six impoverished fellow wine merchants. However the building was demolished in 1971. For centuries Rowlands Castle was known for brick making which ended in 1967. The brick works chimney was demolished in 1971.

Rowlands Castle Golf Club was created in 1903 and the Parish Hall was built in 1914. Rowlands Castle was made a civil parish in 1932. In 1919 a War Memorial was erected in Rowlands Castle. In 1946 a memorial was erected to the day in May 1944 when King George VI reviewed troops shortly before the invasion of Europe.

In the 1960s some residents of Rowlands Castle were worried that the village would become developed and lose its identity. Indeed development did take place. Some new council flats were built in Durrants Road in 1978. Private houses were also built. In 1989 many new private houses were built on the area known as The Triangle, between Manor Lodge Road and Castle Road. Today the population of Rowlands Castle is about 2,600.

The Future:

True, Rowlands Castle has no industry, though numerous shops and small businesses flourish. Supporting village life are the Parish Council: W.I.: RCA: RCCon.: RVS: Guides & Scouts: both Churches: and many more. These groups, as well as organising invaluable annual events, are also the catalyst for change, whilst maintaining

standards. For our village must keep up with the 21st century.

As building developers hover with input from SDNP and EHDC., we have a Neighbourhood Plan Committee who passionately scrutinise proposals for structural changes to our village, including the Gap between Havant and ourselves and the looming threat of 'Fracking' at Markwells Wood. Development sprawl is a very real concern for all villagers, from toddlers to our priceless senior citizens. So it pays to be diligent to protect our way of life. Many consider Rowlands Castle to be the jewel in the Crown, that is Hampshire.

This RCA Magazine is an excellent vehicle for promoting our village. We thank Kevin Connell, outgoing Editor and Kelvin Schäfli, incoming Editor. May this RCA Magazine go from strength to strength, with your support.

By January 1965 I got permission for the school,




I collected booklets on Village history and painted local watercolours. We moved to the Coffee Pot in 1980 and I heard villagers stories.

So a short shopping trip set the happy course of our lives in a village which continues to entrance me.



SEABIRD SIGHTINGS

Langstone Harbour RSPB-managed old Oysterbed lagoons at the West Hayling Local Nature Reserve are well known for its amazing breeding seabird and wintering bird populations.

Free to visit at any time, this is a diverse landscape of tidal mudflats, saltmarsh, seagrass meadows and shingle; Langstone Harbour is home to an internationally important number of breeding seabirds and overwintering wildfowl. The scenery and wildlife can be enjoyed up close at the old Oysterbed lagoons on the Hayling Island shoreline. Nearby, the offshore, wildlife only parts of the reserve can be viewed at a safe distance from the harbour's circumnavigating coastal paths.

In early March, black-headed gulls begin to court and stake territories throughout the harbours shingle islands whilst Mediterranean gulls usually form courting roosts at the old Oysterbeds before dispersing to breed elsewhere. Common terns, sandwich terns and little terns arrive back from migration in March/April and they can be seen fishing throughout the harbour's lagoons and shoreline.

Seabirds echo throughout the harbour in May, June and July with young black-headed gulls and common terns visible up close at the old Oysterbed lagoons. Meanwhile, sandwich terns, little terns and Mediterranean gulls breeding in the more sensitive, no access, offshore parts of the reserve start to bring their young on feeding expeditions in late June and can be seen roosting along the harbour's shore.

FIRST LAMBS OF 2018

We're delighted to announce that the first Butser lambs of 2018 were born early in March.

Two sets of twin boys made their debut into the world, timing it just right to avoid the 'Beast from the East' and the plunging temperatures of that week. All are doing well with the curious lambs exploring their new environment already. After the recent cold snap we're delighted to be witnessing a real sign of spring on our doorstep!

The sheep at Butser are a rare Iron Age breed called Manx Loaghtan. Originally from the Isle

of Man, they have distinctive mousy brown colouring and a striking horned appearance – with up to 6 horns each when fully grown! Manx Loaghtan are designated as 'at risk' by the Rare Breeds Survival Trust; in the 1950s there were only 43 surviving specimens and although this has increased in recent years there are still fewer than 1,500 registered breeding females in the UK. Most of our ewes at Butser are also pregnant so we are delighted to be helping this rare breed animal to thrive and grow.

Now is a great time to visit Butser and see the turning of the seasons and blossoming of new life as we welcome in the warmer spring days. Current opening times are Monday to Friday 10am – 4pm and from April the farm is open seven days a week. For a chance to celebrate the turning of the seasons why not join us for our Beltain Festival on the 5th May to enjoy local ales, food and entertainment before the burning of the great Wickerman?
